

WESTFORD LIBRARY FY'22 BUDGET REQUEST

For FY'22, the Library is requesting a budget of \$79,450 which is a 1% decrease from FY'21. This budget includes a merit increase for the Library Director, funding for a new Library Assistant role, and the move to separately fund up to \$15,000 of FY'22 expenses if needed for items such as digital materials, staff development and travel. This was done in accordance with the Selectboard's request for level or decreased budgeting for FY'22 due to Covid-19.

During the Covid-19 crisis, the Library has remained at the heart of Westford providing curbside service and many other socially distant activities. During the past year the Library has also become a food shelf collection site and partnered with the Winter Wear Share Program. They also began to further their relationship with the Conservation Commission by offering special hikes, story walks and unique trail experiences for Westford hikers. A major impact to the community has been the expansion of the public wi-fi network which the Library secured grant funding for which provides Wi-Fi to the entire common and allows space and privacy for distance learning, telemedicine and vital internet usage.

Coming into 2021, the Library is planning to paint and repair the exterior of the building with funding from the Library General Reserve balance and the trustees recommend the town add a capital budget item for \$10,000 every 8 years to fund such expenses in the future to keep the historic building in good condition.

Julia asked if the amount allotted for the assistant assumed the full fiscal year. Vicky Ross, Library Treasurer, confirmed and it would need to be reassessed depending on Covid. Nanette and Greg would work on putting the Library Expenditures into the Capital Budget it as it had previously been discussed with Vicky. Julia applauded the Library's response to Covid and highlighted how important it has been to the community at this time. Bree has done amazing work. Bill was appreciative that even though their decrease was modest, it was still a decrease.

REQUEST TO UPGRADE PORTION OF ROGERS ROAD – FOLLOW UP

Colen Johnson from TCE representing the Czapski's project on Rogers Road was present to discuss. They had provided plans of the proposed upgrades. The town had gotten feedback from the town attorney. John and Frank discussed removing the pole from the Hasslers and setting a new pole so that drilling could be avoided near the culvert. The board did not feel that any work near the culvert would be feasible nor would they want it running down the ditch.

Bill wanted to hear from the Czapski's about the project. Neil Hackbarth, the Czapski's engineer, explored directional drilling but had provided a clearer overview in their plans. Colen explained that the general thought is to upgrade the road to driveway standards for less than 7 dwellings. There is a wet spot that had been talked about last meeting it is adjacent to the wetland. The proposed access to the property is on the far end because it meets the turnaround for emergency vehicles and the zoning regulations. Underground electrical has been proposed but would not disturb the existing culvert. Glenn Rogers was present, he wanted to know where all the poles for electrical would be. Colen explained they'd all be north side. Frank Hassler, a neighbor, was present. The location of the first pole on the east side of Rogers Brook. His only concern is that if you locate it in such a way, that's one of the main bedrooms in the beautiful old farmhouse that he uses as an Air BnB. Aesthetically, it would not be great if it got in the way of the view. To Bill it seems most of the concern was that there had been some give and take and that the Czapski's team had worked with the Hasslers to meet an agreement. Frank had also been concerned about water quality; his well is very close to the

brook. Nobody has lived upstream previously. Bill directed the conversation towards the Road Agreement. Bill asked Neil if he was familiar with any of the other similar road agreements around town? Neil was not. Allison explained the next step for the town would be that the Town Attorney draft an agreement to be recorded in the land records.

Chapin Kaynor was present and had some concerns. The road has been Class IV since 1974 or similar so the trees on both sides of the road have expanded and grown and the way that is drawn on the charts would disrupt that row of sugar maples on the north side. Bill wondered if power goes underground to the property, is that underground construction within the town right of way? Colen confirmed it was. Chapin knows the trees are in the right of way but is concerned that since this road has not been touched for 50 years, the disturbance to the trees would disrupt the classic view on the road. John asked Colen if this is the area where they were hoping to take down the slope and would thus have to take out said trees. Colen confirmed that yes there would need to be some tree removal. Chapin also mentioned that the two proposed pull offs on his area of the road proposed that would also take down trees. Chapin has owned his property since 1975. He doesn't have legal standing about the trees since they are in the right of way, but he does feel like they are part of his property considering they have been undisturbed for so long and nobody but VAST has used the road.

Ann was present and was concerned where run off was going to go and wanted to make sure that it didn't create a wetland near her residence. She also didn't want to see trees removed. Bill explained that this is why we have zoning regulations. Glenn wanted to discuss the rumor that this was eventually going to be subdivided and have two houses built on it. Colen confirmed that the lot had been subdivided in the 80s and that the Czapskis own both lots and only one house has been approved in the far corner.

What Bill has garnered at this point is that there is concern from neighbors about how things will look and how things will be accomplished. Bill suggested a walk-through site visit for concerned parties with the engineer. Frank Hassler wondered how trash pickup will occur with this new resident since the section is still Class IV. He explains that current residents already haul their trash down to the corner of Old Stage and Rogers Road. John was hopeful with the improvements that have been made that the trash haulers will be going back down the road soon.

2021 TOWN MEETING

Governor Scott has signed an act that changes some of the rules for town meeting due to Covid-19. These changes include not requiring signatures for candidates placed on the local ballot. Any municipality may apply the Australian ballot system to any or all municipal meetings held in the year 2021 by vote of its legislative body and the Secretary of State may waive statutory deadlines or other provisions related to a municipal election as necessary in order for the municipality to apply the Australian ballot system to its meeting.

REQUEST FROM GIRL SCOUTS TO HOLD TREE LIGHTING IN GAZEBO

The local Girl Scout Troop is requesting permission to hold a tree lighting and caroling in the gazebo the first weekend in December as they have done in previous years. Rogers Tree Farm will be donating a tree. Julia feels positive about the event since people have been respectful about distancing. Allison motioned to allow the Girl Scouts to have the tree lighting as long as whatever the governor's guidance at the time of the gathering is followed, Bill 2nd. Motion passed 3-0.

TRAFFIC STUDY UPDATE

Charlie Baker from CCRPC had provided an update on the traffic study being done around town. They had completed gathering data on Woods Hollow Road and had gotten good data. They had attempted to gather information on Brookside Road, but the data was not good, and they needed to re-do it. Studies on Cambridge Road and Old Stage. This traffic study is the first step to knowing if and where changes would need to be made on our roads.

Traffic has been a topic of conversation lately in Westford. The way the contract with the Sheriff is written, the Selectboard don't get to direct their work, but they are working with them to ensure roads with traffic issues get attention. The Roads and Trails committee has also been looking into items and will speak next meeting.

CORRESPONDENCE

Calef Letorney had suggested that some emergency barrels of sand be provided on the hill areas of town to ensure that people don't get stuck, Julia feels it is a simple and low cost solution to helping people this year. She was curious of John's thoughts. John was concerned they would be buried in the snowbanks and would be taken out by the plow. Dave Lavallee has done similar things in the past and the sand just freezes so would be unhelpful.
