WINTER ROADS

What you need to know about winter road conditions

- **Plowing:** begins when the snow has accumulated 2-3 inches. Each plow route takes the road crew about 4 hours to complete.
- **Sand:** applied to all gravel roads. Some particles may be large enough to cause windshield damage. Use caution and avoid following other vehicles closely.
- **Mailboxes:** Westford does <u>NOT</u> repair or replace mailboxes damaged by the plow.
- Plowing Across Town Roads: plowing snow from driveways across town roads is prohibited.

Reminders:

- Each winter storm is different, roads may be icy, and sand may be loose. Drive slowly and know what your vehicle is capable of.
- Watch for walkers and wildlife. It will be more difficult to see pedestrians and recreational users of roads this time of year due to snowbanks. Walkers, bikers, and other users can do their part by wearing bright, reflective clothing.
- Some VAST trails cross Westford Roads. Know where the trails are and watch for crossing snowmobiles. You can find a list of VAST trails here: <u>https://vtvast.org/trails.html</u>
- Several hunting seasons occur during early winter. Watch for vehicles parked on the side of roads for hunting access. Pedestrians & pets should wear orange/yellow reflective clothing during hunting seasons to help ensure they are seen. <u>SCHOOL TRAILS WINTER USE</u>: In an effort to accommodate everyone, so we can all enjoy the trails, please consider the following:

- These are public trails. They are for everyone.
- Walkers/Snowshoers Please walk on the groomed trail on the opposite side of the ski track (the indented tracks that look like skis fit in them) set for cross-country skiers. If there are no x-country tracks set, walkers please try to stay to one side of the groomed trail so the other side can be set for x-country tracks.
- Everyone needs to be aware of other people on the trail. Let's stay safe!

<u>ALL TRAILS – SPRING USE</u> – Seems like we've seen more mud than snow, so if the trend continues, please stay off trails that are too muddy/wet for passage. If you can't walk on the trail and need to go around to the side, it probably means you shouldn't be on the trail. There may be trail closures due to conditions.

TRAILS: Please let us know if you see downed trees or other required maintenance to any of the trails. We're happy to go out and clean things up!

TRASH, RECYCLING & FOOD SCRAPS IN WESTFORD

Did you know that you are not supposed to put your recycling in plastic bags of any kind? The <u>only</u> exception to this is shredded office paper, which is accepted only if it's in a CLEAR BAG that's tightly closed.

Here are some other items that do <u>NOT</u> belong in your recycling bin:

- Dirty containers
- Plastic wrap
- Durable plastic (e.g., Tupperware, laundry bins, etc.)
- Styrofoam
- Motor oil or hazardous waste containers

Food Scraps (Effective July 1, 2020, per Act 148, food scraps are banned from landfills.)

What are food scraps?

Food scraps are parts of food that are typically discarded rather than eaten: peels, rinds, cores, eggshells, seeds, pits, bones, shells, coffee grounds and filters, loose-leaf tea, and fats/oils/grease. Food scraps is also food that was eaten but not finished: "plate scraps" or leftovers that went bad. Any type of food can become food scraps including bread, pasta, soup, vegetables, fruit, sauces, meat, fish, dairy, sweets, etc.

What should I do with meat and bones?

If you compost in your yard, the law allows you to put meat and bones in the trash, so they don't attract animals to your composting bin. If you chose to bring food scraps to a drop-off center, you can include meat and bones with the rest of your food scraps.

SEASONAL COMPOSTING TIPS: Winter

- Leaves and grass clippings are valuable compost materials because they are carbon rich. Add them in small batches to avoid matting (too many leaves clump together and slow down the compost process)
- Cover your pile or use an enclosed composter to keep things moist but not sodden. This will also deter pests like bears, raccoons, and mice.
- Other items that can go in your compost this time of year include wood ash and the skeletons of annual flowers & plants. Break down large-bodied plants like tomatoes and broccoli before adding them to your pile.
- Store compost material like leaves & grass in a burlap sack near your pile for adding with food scraps.

The Clean Water Advisory Committee

The CWAC oversees the Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission activities and policy development regarding but not limited to, the Vermont Lake Champlain Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) Plan and its related plans and programs. CCRPC Lamoille Basin Water Quality Council

The responsibilities of a BWQC as outlined § 39-502 of the CWSP Rule are:

(a) The purpose of a BWQC is to establish policy and make decisions for the CWSP regarding the most significant water quality impairments that exist in the basin and prioritizing the clean water projects that will address those impairments based on the basin plan.

(b) When prioritizing clean water projects and prioritizing the most significant water quality impairments in the basin, the BWQC shall consult with the basin plan and CWSP and utilize the Agency's project selection protocols.

(c) The BWQC shall participate in the basin planning process established in 10 V.S.A. § 1253(d).

Potential members should be:

- knowledgeable on clean water topics for the applicable basin
- Interested in prioritizing and selecting non-regulatory clean water projects for funding at quarterly BWQC meetings
- Interested in participating in the applicable Tactical Basin Planning process

FROM THE ZONING ADMINISTRATOR

The Town website now has online, fillable forms for Planning and Zoning applications! It isn't always easy to get to the Town Office to drop off paperwork, so now you can electronically file a Zoning Permit application, Certificate of Occupancy application, or Development Review application. All Planning and Zoning forms can be found at https://westfordvt.us/documents/forms/.

As spring approaches, many town residents are starting to plan projects. Please remember that you need a zoning permit for any development on your property. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Constructing or structurally altering any structure with a footprint of more than 100 square feet;
- Mining, excavating, filling, or grading land that involves moving more than 50 cubic yards of material;
- Changing the use of land or a structure;
- Operating a business from your home;
- Adjusting or relocating the boundary between two parcels; or
- Dividing a parcel into two or more lots.

Update from the Senate's Chittenden-North District

As your sole Chittenden-North Senator, I've spent eight weeks getting up to speed and embracing my new role, representing Westford, Fairfax, Milton, and Essex (part).

I'm in good company as a freshman legislator. Fully one-third of the General Assembly (60 of 180) members are new this year, including House Rep. Julia Andrews who represents Westford and part of Milton (Chittenden-25 district).

Senators serve on two five-member committees. I was appointed to Agriculture, which works on a variety of farm, environmental, food, and consumer protection issues. And to Institutions, the committee that determines how the Capital Budget of \$203M gets spent on hundreds of state buildings, including correctional facilities.

I've also joined the Rural Caucus, in which dozens of legislators come together each week to discuss issues and propose legislation affecting small villages and rural areas.

The bill getting the most attention this month is the Affordable Heat Act, S.5. It's a complex scheme to reduce greenhouse gases by tapping fuel dealers to sell heat-pumps, alternative fuels, etc. within an energy-credit trading model. Bottom-line: dealers expect to charge their customers an AHA fee to cover the costs of their mandated participation in this scenario, should this bill pass.

I'm hearing pushback from hundreds of customers who can't stomach higher prices and from small fuel dealers who bristle at the prospect of more red tape. I wish this bill would instead incentivize customers to buy heat pumps, and dealers to offer cleaner blends of propane, as other states have.

Rep. Andrews and I met with the Selectboard and several Town Staff on February 20th to discuss pressing concerns, including the ongoing need for cell service and a community wastewater system.





Community Wastewater Project Update

The next phase of the community wastewater project is about to begin! The Selectboard has approved the contracts with Stone Environmental, Inc., and Birchline Planning, LLC. Outreach to property owners in the service territory for potential connection will begin early this Spring. This next phase is to conduct further analysis, refine and update the cost estimate, and develop final designs. This will enable the Town to answer specific questions such as:

- What are the anticipated costs;
- How will ledge along Brookside Road be handled;
- What will the final design look like;
- How does drip dispersal work?

The Town will also be able to begin developing a sewer ordinance that would be adopted by the Select Board after a successful bond vote. The ordinance will establish how capacity is allocated, how connection and user fees are calculated, and the process for property owners in the service territory to connect to the system.

The Wastewater Outreach Advisory Committee will be working in March with the Town's Consultants and the Planning Commission on a Communication Plan to provide timely information and further promote community engagement and discussion, with the goal of having a well-informed electorate. Westford Recreation needs you!

The Westford Recreation Department was created by the Selectboard years ago with the mission "to provide recreational, educational, cultural and community activities to all Westford residents and neighbors." The department is run by a Committee of 7 volunteer members (with a quorum of 4 – meetings must have 4 members present to vote) assisted by the paid part-time Recreation Coordinator.

The Committee generally meets the first Tuesday of each month from 7:00 p.m. until not later than 9:00 p.m. That is really the basic requirement, just lend your voice and ideas to the meetings!

The current Committee members, and their specialties are:

- ★ Ben McElvany Treasurer as well as adult pick up basketball and soccer programs
- ★ Chuck Medick Vice Chair and Ice Rink installer/take down specialist (but Chuck has other life commitments and needs to step down).
- ★ Deanna Norton member as of November 2022, Turkey Trot and kids programs
- ★ George Elliott, "Professor Squelch" Chair and kids programs
- ★ Lori Miller Secretary and Futsal lead, Santa letters, rink daily check-in with shoveling
- ★ Maria Olson newest member and rink shoveling crew member extraordinaire!

As you can see, there are only six Committee members – soon to be five, so your help is needed on the committee!

However, the Committee is made up of volunteers whose purpose is to direct and guide the Westford Recreation Department offerings, not provide all programming! We really need help. Volunteer leads/instructors/guides are needed for everything offered. Essex Parks & Rec has at least 6 full-time staff members, even Fairfax has 2 paid positions, WRD truly relies on the wonderful community!

Through the anonymous **Suggest an activity** link on the website, we've had some great suggestions already. However, we need help implementing them. The activities suggested so far are:

- → Adult drop-in craft group we've got a space we can use, we just need someone to take lead.
- → Pre-K open gym activities for that have been suggested as well, need a volunteer lead.



- → Paint & Sips for adults and/or youth, an instructor is needed
- → Adult game nights again need one person as lead.

→ Elementary fun dance lessons - we don't need a competition team, just a high school student or adult who would teach youth some organized dance moves.

→ Finally moonlight nature walks - the suggestion

had lots of ideas modeled after something the

participant got to enjoy in another town, sounds like fun with an organizer to make it happen.





Then there are the summer programs the community wants to see offered. Past summer programs have included: archery, basketball, camps of all types, conditioning, 4th of July, kickball, Pre-K developmental sports, volleyball, soccer, teen adventure series, just to name a few!

Finally, the Community Ice Rink that the Committee was invited to take over requires regular help. A Rink Master (to make decisions and organize) and physical helpers to set up, maintain (shovel & snow-blow), and take down are really vital to keeping this community resource functioning. Without dedicated volunteers in place, the rink might not be available in the future.



Volunteering is pretty easy – the committee

tries to make it as painless as possible. All volunteers must pass a background check. Rosters are completed, materials as voted on by the Committee are provided, and as much support as is possible is offered.
