#### Dog Licenses

Dog Licenses were due on April 1<sup>st</sup>. If you have not yet licensed your dog, please do so as soon as possible (Dog licenses obtained after April 1<sup>st</sup> are subject to a late fee). **Licensing your dog is Vermont Law** AND helps the town be able to return your dog more quickly to you if they ever get out or lost.

A current rabies certificate is required. If you are unsure if the current certificate is on file, please call the Town Office. **If you no longer have your dog or your dog has passed away, please let us know**. For your convenience you may mail or drop off the fee and rabies certificate along with a self-addressed stamped envelope and your license will be mailed to you.

## FALL ROADS

#### Phelps Road will be closed August 28 – August 31 from 8am to 4pm

The Road Crew will be ditching and stone lining the ditches as part of a grant the Town received. The work is part of a larger project for erosion control and to mitigate stormwater runoff in accordance to Act 64, the Vermont Clean Water Act.

## WESTFORD COMMON USE POLICY

This policy has been implemented to avoid conflicts since there is more use of the Common. #### **CCRPC Lamoille Basin Water Quality Council**

The responsibilities of a BWQC as outlined § 39-502 of the CWSP Rule are:

(a) The purpose of a BWQC is to establish policy and make decisions for the CWSP regarding the most significant water d-quality impairments that exist in the basin and prioritizing the clean water projects that will address those impairments based on the basin plan.

(b) When prioritizing clean water projects and prioritizing the most significant water quality impairments in the basin, the BWQC shall consult with the basin plan and CWSP and utilize the Agency's project selection protocols.

(c) The BWQC shall participate in the basin planning process established in 10 V.S.A. § 1253(d).

Potential members should be:

- knowledgeable on clean water topics for the applicable basin
- Interested in prioritizing and selecting non-regulatory clean water projects for funding at quarterly BWQC meetings
- Interested in participating in the applicable Tactical Basin Planning process

#### The Wastewater Bond Vote will be held on November 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023 at the Westford School from 7am-7pm.

**The town will be sending ballots in the mail to ALL ACTIVE VOTERS**. This was a decision made by the Selectboard during their August 10<sup>th</sup> meeting. Your mail-in ballot will come with return postage so you can easily send your ballot to the town. You may also drop your ballot off at the town office in the secure drop box outside of the office to the left of the front door OR in the drop box inside by the front counter. On polling day, please drop all ballots off at the polling location: the gym at the Westford School on Brookside Road.

If you want to vote physically at the polls you are always more than welcome to do so! Please bring your ballot with you if you can, but no worries if you forget, we always have ballots available. You are also welcome to come with your already filled out absentee ballot and put it through the tabulator yourself!

## **A Howard Coffin Presentation**

"Vermont, 1800 and Froze to Death; The Cold Year of 1816"



1816 has long been known as the year without summer. Vermonters still call it "1800 and Froze to Death," a year of frosts every month, dark skies, and mysterious lights that caused a widespread belief that a higher power was displeased.

In this talk, historian Howard Coffin includes scores of anecdotes on the dark year of failed crops, scarce food, and religious revival. Vermonters coped with the cold year with neighbor helping neighbor.



# TRASH, RECYCLING & FOOD SCRAPS IN WESTFORD

Did you know that you are not supposed to put your recycling in plastic bags of any kind? The <u>only</u> exception to this is shredded office paper, which is accepted only if it's in a CLEAR BAG that's tightly closed.

Here are some other items that do <u>NOT</u> belong in your recycling bin:

- Dirty containers
- Plastic wrap
- Durable plastic (e.g., Tupperware, laundry bins, etc.)
- Styrofoam
- Motor oil or hazardous waste containers

#### Food Scraps (Effective July 1, 2020, per Act 148, food scraps are banned from landfills.)

#### What are food scraps?

Food scraps are parts of food that are typically discarded rather than eaten: peels, rinds, cores, eggshells, seeds, pits, bones, shells, coffee grounds and filters, loose-leaf tea, and fats/oils/grease. Food scraps is also food that was eaten but not finished: "plate scraps" or leftovers that went bad. Any type of food can become food scraps including bread, pasta, soup, vegetables, fruit, sauces, meat, fish, dairy, sweets, etc.

#### What should I do with meat and bones?

If you compost in your yard, the law allows you to put meat and bones in the trash, so they don't attract animals to your composting bin. If you chose to bring food scraps to a drop-off center, you can include meat and bones with the rest of your food scraps.

#### **SEASONAL COMPOSTING TIPS: FALL**

- Leaves and grass clippings are valuable compost materials because they are carbon rich. Add them in small batches to avoid matting (too many leaves clump together and slow down the compost process)
- Cover your pile or use an enclosed composter to keep things moist but not sodden. This will also deter pests like bears, raccoons, and mice.
- Other items that can go in your compost this time of year include wood ash and the skeletons of annual flowers & plants. Break down large-bodied plants like tomatoes and broccoli before adding them to your pile.
- Store compost material like leaves & grass in a burlap sack near your pile for adding with food scraps.

True biz? The students at the River Valley School for the Deaf just want to hook up, pass their history finals, and have politicians, doctors, and their parents stop telling them what to do with their bodies. This revelatory novel plunges readers into the halls of a residential school for the deaf, where they'll meet Charlie, a rebellious transfer student who's never met another deaf person before; Austin, the school's golden boy, whose world is rocked when his baby sister is born hearing; and February, the hearing headmistress, a CODA (child of deaf adult(s)) who is fighting to keep her school open and her marriage intact, but might not be able to do both. As a series of crises both personal and political threaten to unravel each of them, Charlie, Austin, and February find their lives inextricable from one another-and changed forever.

This is a story of sign language and lipreading, disability and civil rights, isolation and injustice, first love and loss, and, above all, great persistence, daring, and joy.
