TOWN OFFICE NOTES

Property Tax Bills

You should receive your 2024 property tax bill no later than July 15th. Please contact the town office if you do not receive your tax bill by this date.

The first of four installments is due Tuesday, August 15th. Payments will be considered timely if they are received by this date, have an August 15th postmark (postal, FedEx, or UPS), or are in the drop box located to the left of the Town Office door <u>before</u> the office opens at 8:30am on Friday August 16th. **If your taxes are escrowed, it is your responsibility to forward a copy of your tax bill to your mortgage company in a timely manner while retaining a copy for your records**.

Please note – If you pay your taxes using Bill Pay (generating a check online through your financial institution), make sure you allow sufficient time for mailing. These envelopes do not bear a postmark therefore will be acknowledged by the date <u>received</u> at the Town Office <u>not</u> by the date on the check.

In July, the State will send notifications to homeowners explaining the Education Tax Credit. If you are receiving a school tax adjustment it will be reflected on your tax bill. You should compare the letter with your tax bill.

State Primary Election

Dog Licenses

Dog Licenses were Due on April 1st. If you have not yet licensed your dog, please do so as soon as possible. Dogs are legally required to be vaccinated for rabies and licensed in Vermont if they are over the age of four months. New dogs will not incur any late fees for registration, but those that have been licensed in the past will now be \$14.00 for a spayed/neutered dog and \$17.00 for an intact dog.

SUMMER ROADS

What you need to know about summer road conditions

- Road Projects: many projects are being done on the roads at this time. Slow down and give crews space to work.
- **Dust:** roads can become dusty in dry weather and potholes can appear in heavily traveled areas. Going the speed limit can reduce dusty and damaged roads.
- **Roadside Mowing:** roadsides are mowed to increase visibility and keep invasive plants at bay. Mowing occurs twice a year: once in late spring/early summer and once later in summer.
- **Traffic Speeds:** due to the hard-packed conditions of the roads this time of year, overall vehicle speeds can increase. Be aware of speed limits.
- **Repairs:** roads are repaired as weather allows. Know that this takes time, especially if conditions are poor, so it may take the road crew some time to get to your road. Highly traveled roads are prioritized.
- Dangerous Driving: We've reached the unofficial start of summer, which means beautiful days for recreating on town roads. This is also a time of year where the Selectboard hears concerns from residents about cars speeding or driving dangerously along our roads. The Selectboard urges citizens to reach out directly to our contracted Deputy Sheriff, Brian Welch, at 802-863-7507 to report traffic incidents or routinely speeding vehicles. The more details you can share, the better! Where was the speeder? What were they driving? What time of day was it? Do you notice a pattern of behavior from a particular driver? Deputy Welch is glad to assist, but if you cannot reach Brian directly, please alert the Town Office and share details that can be passed along.

- Clean up your doggy doodoo. Bags are provided at kiosks at the Westford School.


- Keep dogs off private property. Our town trails abut and intersect private property.

<u>Tick awareness</u>: Ticks are always around. Be sure to check your skin and clothing after spending time in the forest and fields of our trails.

Porcupine awareness: Be aware that porcupines have been sited and dogs have been quilled on Riverside North Trail in Misty Meadows Town Forest.

Maple Shade Town Forest trail improvements:

Forestry and Trail improvement projects are now completed at MSTF. We would like to thank our



forester Evan Aiken and WCC member Joel Fay for the fantastic work done to remediate the trails. We highly recommend taking a walk on the **Boundary Line Trail** (green on the map).

The CWAC oversees the Chittenden County Regional Planning Commission activities and policy development regarding but not limited to, the Vermont Lake Champlain Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) Plan and its related plans and programs. CCRPC Lamoille Basin Water Quality Council

The responsibilities of a BWQC as outlined § 39-502 of the CWSP Rule are:

(a) The purpose of a BWQC is to establish policy and make decisions for the CWSP regarding the most significant water d-quality impairments that exist in the basin and prioritizing the clean water projects that will address those impairments based on the basin plan.

(b) When prioritizing clean water projects and prioritizing the most significant water quality impairments in the basin, the BWQC shall consult with the basin plan and CWSP and utilize the Agency's project selection protocols.

(c) The BWQC shall participate in the basin planning process established in 10 V.S.A. § 1253(d).

Potential members should be:

- knowledgeable on clean water topics for the applicable basin
- Interested in prioritizing and selecting non-regulatory clean water projects for funding at quarterly BWQC meetings
- Interested in participating in the applicable Tactical Basin Planning process

MUNICIPAL JOB OPENINGS

DOG WARDEN

The Town of Westford is looking for someone who is interested in serving as Dog Warden. What is a Dog Warden? A Dog Warden is a person who helps dog owners comply with the Westford Dog Ordinance.

Qualifications: A love for dogs, the ability to communicate effectively and a location to bring dogs until they can be reunited with their owner to name a few. You may think you need a kennel to be a Dog Warden. This is not the case. However, a stray dog does need to be kept in a healthy environment until it is reunited with the owner. A healthy environment includes shelter, food, water, and a suitable area for them to relieve themselves.

The Dog Warden position receives an annual stipend of \$500 and there are funds available for training, supplies and mileage. The Town also has supplies, including a dog house, that can be utilized. Westford residency is preferred but not required.

FULL TIME ROAD CREW MEMBER

We will have Girls That Grow taco truck here for all concert events, in addition to Deb Nevil our Kingdom Ice Cream vendor. Hoping to get Gracie's Popcorn stand for one or two of the shows as well. Here's what we've got on tap for 2024:

July 21 – The Eames Brothers Band:

This band is self-described as "Mountain Blues" and is one of my favorite Vermont original bands. Seth Eames as lead singer/songwriter and guitarist and brother Ralph on Bass present a formidable front for lyrical and thoughtful tunes all based in infectious grooves. Phil Carr will round out the brothers on drums. If you haven't heard these boys before, you are in for a treat.

July 28 – The Tenderbellies:

Hinesburg based Tenderbellies is a string band that goes where no string band has gone before. Mixing Americana with bluegrass, new grass, jazz and rock elements, they serve up a tasty amalgam of newly written tunes with old favorites baked in a way you've never tasted before. I love that they have a bluegrass harp player.

August 4 – Shellhouse:

A return of local favorites Shellhouse, playing classic and varied rock standards for your listening pleasure. Bob Teer and company will also be rolling out some newly written tunes, soon to be recorded, so be sure to be the first to hear some of these at our summer show.

August 11 – Skip Gorman:

Skip Gorman is a national treasure that has devoted much of his musical career to the rediscovery of original American folk string music. He has contributed to a number of Ken Burns' documentaries, the most recent being American Buffalo. He was our guest artist last winter for our Common Hall show of December 17, and had more tunes to play that we had time for him to play. We are fortunate to have him return to our concert series to share his love of deeply historical string music, and associated instruments.

August 18 – Steph Pappas Experience:

Steph Pappas was one of Burlington's original girl punk rockers, forming the all-girl Burlington based band, Miss Bliss. Now recording under the self-managed and owned Guitar Girl label and known for fronting an evolving and eclectic band of merry-makers that can steer self-directed-in-the-moment creations that veer from folk to jug band to hard core to audience participation and back to country flavored offerings in a delightfully dizzying array. Truly an experience not to miss bliss.

RED BRICK COFFEE HOUSE UPDATE

The Westford Red Brick Coffee House will be teaming up with the new Westford Country Store for Friday evening music during the summer months. For the last few years, the coffee house has been taken to the Common gazebo as the preferred place to hold the Coffee House during warm summer weather. With the Country Store also looking to have live music outside on their back porch on Fridays as well, I didn't want to have two different outdoor events going on within earshot of each other, so we have agreed to merge our events together. So, for June 7 and August 2 we will move our Coffee House to the store. July Coffee House will be postponed due to my being away. The store will have music set for that date. We will have to see how September pans out.

For the Country Store dates there will be a set up for vocal mics and a small personal amp for instruments. Participants should plan to bring whatever support equipment they need for their presentation. All forms of presentations are welcome for the Coffee House (stand up, single or duo or full band time slots, storytelling, juggling, fire dancing, magic acts, etc.). Eyeglasses and Hearing Aids for Recycling

The Jericho-Underhill Lions Club have placed collection boxes in the Westford Library & Westford Town Clerk's Office. The Collection Boxes are there for anyone that has used eyeglasses and used hearing aids that wishes to donate them for recycling. All you need to do is deposit them in the boxes and the Jericho-Underhill Lion's Club will take care of it from there.

TRASH, RECYCLING & FOOD SCRAPS IN WESTFORD

Did you know that you are not supposed to put your recycling in plastic bags of any kind? The <u>only</u> exception to this is shredded office paper, which is accepted only if it's in a CLEAR BAG that's tightly closed.

Here are some other items that do <u>NOT</u> belong in your recycling bin:

- Dirty containers
- Plastic wrap
- Durable plastic (e.g., Tupperware, laundry bins, etc.)
- Styrofoam
- Motor oil or hazardous waste containers

Food Scraps (Effective July 1, 2020, per Act 148, food scraps are banned from landfills.)

What are food scraps?

Food scraps are parts of food that are typically discarded rather than eaten: peels, rinds, cores, eggshells, seeds, pits, bones, shells, coffee grounds and filters, loose-leaf tea, and fats/oils/grease. Food scraps is also food that was eaten but not finished: "plate scraps" or leftovers that went bad. Any type of food can become food scraps including bread, pasta, soup, vegetables, fruit, sauces, meat, fish, dairy, sweets, etc.

What should I do with meat and bones?

If you compost in your yard, the law allows you to put meat and bones in the trash, so they don't attract animals to your composting bin. If you chose to bring food scraps to a drop-off center, you can include meat and bones with the rest of your food scraps.

SEASONAL COMPOSTING TIPS: Summer

- Break up material (both food scraps and browns) into small pieces. This allows for decomposition to happen quickly, meaning you'll have usable compost faster!
- Water your compost! If compost is dry it stops generating heat. Keeping compost moist will help things decompose quickly.
- Dry grass and egg shells make great additions to your pile. For best decomposition your pile should be 1/4th browns and 3/4th other items such as food scraps, coffee grounds and green lawn clippings.

A dramatic account of the worst forest fire in American history.

On the afternoon of August 20, 1910, a battering ram of wind moved through the drought-stricken national forest of Washington, Idaho, and Montana, whipping the hundreds of small blazes burning across the forest floor into a roaring inferno. Forest rangers had assembled nearly ten thousand men-college boys, day workers, immigrants from mining camps-to fight the fire. But no living person had seen anything like those flames, and neither the rangers nor anyone else knew how to subdue them.

Timothy Egan narrates the struggles of the overmatched ranges against the implacable fire with unstoppable dramatic force. Equally dramatic is the larger story he tells of outsize president Teddy Roosevelt ad his chief forester, Gifford Pinchot. Pioneering the notion of conservation, Roosevelt and Pinchot did nothing less than create the idea of public land as our national treasure, owned by and preserved for every citizen.

Senator Irene Wrenner, Chittenden North

June 24, 2024

After our 2024 session ended in May, legislators returned to the capital on June 17th for a veto override session. Governor Phil Scott vetoed a significant number of bills this year.



Six were overridden. I will cover the headline makers

below; a seventh, the veto on **H.121, the Data Privacy bill**, was not overridden. Consumer data is under constant threat, as is the well-being of children who use the internet. The bill addressed some of the addictive properties of children's apps. I voted to override, but the Senate fell six votes shy of doing so.

I wrote about **H.687, the Land Use bill**, last month. I don't favor bills too complex to explain to constituents. No one's quite sure where all these new houses will be built, as every area has its constraints. One big constraint for certain towns is the handling of sewage, which is frequently and illegally dumped into our rivers and lakes. I believe we need to shore up this infrastructure before adding residents. Keep our waterways clean and our landscapes in production.

H.887, the Yield bill sets the Homestead Tax Rate. It must be sufficient to meet the total amount voters approved in every town to fund their schools. The legislature, by law, must set a rate.

I've been asked why I didn't vote No on the override. Please keep in mind that the only way that several legislators can vote No on the Yield Bill is when a majority can be counted on to vote Yes, a politically fraught position because of the lack of understanding of what this bill does. I've spent the past week in conversation with residents who believe a No vote would've saved them money.

In fact, the veto of the yield bill itself appears to have been a risky political maneuver. The implications of not enacting the yield bill are serious: Vermonters would face property tax increases of up to 30% and there would be an \$82 million deficit in the Education Fund, putting Vermonters and Vermont's public education system in an extremely tenuous position.

One important note: If you're on a fixed income or otherwise qualify for a discount on your taxes, you may be entitled to receive a homestead rebate. Up to

70% of Vermont property owners receive that discount, so not everyone would face the predicted 13.8% increase.

H.289, the Renewable Energy Standard bill would add an estimated 2% - 7% to the cost of electricity in Vermont. (The total cost of this RES was estimated to be as high as \$1 billion over ten years.) I believe this is an unaffordable means to an industrial end. Rather than levy a tax to accelerate the move to renewable sources of energy – not all of which are available when demand is highest – let's renew our focus on conserving resources and reducing consumption.

I recently learned that just 2% of greenhouse gas emissions in VT come from the generation of electricity. Maybe we should focus our efforts on reducing other, larger sources of carbon and methane emissions instead?

This article describes the underlying issue that I've come to see as the problem with bills such as last year's S.5 (Clean Heat Standard) and this year's H.289, which were drafted by parties who stood to benefit: https://robertbryce.substack.com/p/environmentalism-in-america-is-dead.

Please know that I served for 15 years on the Essex Energy Committee. I am all about saving the planet through conservation, not consumerism.

H.72, Overdose Prevention Center bill would provide a temporary, safe injection site in Burlington, at which people could use illegal drugs in a supervised environment and receive immediate attention if they overdose or get help to stop using if they so choose.

An OPC should free up first responders who were hired to fight fires and enforce the law, among other duties, but have been regularly called to deal with overdoses happening throughout the city.

I believe in local control. All the top officials in Burlington have begged for this pilot program. I voted to give them permission to try this, since they're low on options. Funding for this pilot comes from a drug company settlement, not taxes.

If we don't encourage substance users to remove themselves and their waste from Church Street, for example, I foresee the state losing tourist dollars. Vermonters could then be asked to make up the deficit via taxes that no one is eager to pay.
